The 2021 Season is upon us and I have had the opportunity to converse with several Property Owners who have noticed the renovations that have taken place this past year. Beyond the day-to-day services and maintenance of the property, each year Woodhaven does improvements. Those improvements are your assessments at work for you. When walking around the property, please take notice of just some of the improvements

that were done this past year that I've highlighted below:

- Woodhaven Lakes Trail improvement by Section 23. You can now walk the trail around Woodhaven Lakes in it's entirety. Some minor work to complete it will be done this Fall.



#### Memorial Day Weekend Attendance

Wow, it was good to see our Property Owners and guests back out enjoying a Memorial Day weekend at Woodhaven! As with most weekends at Woodhaven, attendance is weather dependent. While the weather wasn't favorable for swimming, the nighttime temps in the high 30s were perfect for campfires and s'mores. There were 3,511 active lots over the weekend which translates to an estimated attendance of 13,904. The average estimated attendance over the last five Memorial Day Weekends (excluding 2020) is 14,131; with a high attendance of 16,009 in 2018 and a low attendance of 11,209 in 2019.

#### **Audit & Annual Report**

The March 31st, 2021, audit process has been completed and the preliminary report was presented to the Audit Committee on June 12, 2021 for final review and approval. A copy of the short report will be presented in the 2021 Annual Report, which will be distributed to Membership in August in the *Woodhaven News* and at the Annual Meeting. #### **Real Estate Tax Bills**

Paula Meyer, Lee County Treasurer, has provided the Association with a press release, which is included in this issue of the *Woodhaven News*, regarding real estate tax bills for 2020, due in 2021 for Lee County, IL. Please review this information and arrange to pay your taxes when they are due. The first installment is due July 2nd, 2021, and the second installment is due September 3rd, 2021.

Each Property Owner should have received a tax bill for their Woodhaven property. The Lee County real estate tax bill is a separate invoice from your Association assessment, and each Owner is required to make payments directly to Lee County. If the tax bill is not paid, the delinquent taxes will be offered for sale by Lee County, and you could end up losing your property through the delinquent tax sale process. If you have any questions or concerns regarding your real estate tax bill, please contact the Lee County Treasurers' office at (815) 288-4477.

#### Stay Golden Ale

You know what's awesome? Talking about beer under the business portion of our article! The first 30-barrel batch (approximately 325 cases) of Stay Golden Ale flew off the shelves. As of this writing, stock levels are critically low, and by the time you read this, our guess is it will be completely gone. The good news? Our friends and collaborators at Noon Whistle Brewing will be brewing a second 15-barrel batch for us and we expect to see more Stay Golden Ale sometime in early July. In the meantime, watch for special tastings along with the chance to win some cool swag to pop up over the course of the summer at various events. Some will be announced on our social media sites and others will be random and a complete surprise. So, get out and attend all the amazing events and entertainment we have put together for you this year, and you just may get a chance to try an ice-cold sample of this delicious beverage!

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#### **Municipal Aggregation Update**

In June of 2020, Lee County entered into a 3-year municipal aggregation contract with AEP Energy with a fixed electric supply rate of \$0.05634/kWh. The terms for the new contract provide this rate for the entire 3-year term, ending with the July 2023 meter read. This program replaced the prior 3-year contract, which was with Dynegy and had a fixed electric supply rate of \$0.06787/kWh.

Participation in the aggregation program is an individual decision and each Property Owner should take some time to evaluate their options. The Association has compiled data on the performance of the current contract compared with the rates applied by Com Ed over the same period. This data is based on invoices received for lots owned by Woodhaven and provides information beginning with the 2020 May/June invoice period through the most recent billing data.

Some additional information for Owners to consider:

- The shaded area includes figures based on information provided from reports provided by the ICC. The lots owned by Woodhaven did not report any usage in the shaded billing period.
- $\bullet$  Com Ed's reported base rate for June 2021 to September 2021 is 0.06776/kWh.
- Com Ed's billing system for supply rates includes a line item called Purchase Electricity Adjustment or PEA. This item can be listed as a credit or as a charge and has a cap of \$0.005/kWh in either direction.
- With consideration of the PEA credit/charge, the summer Com Ed rate has a range of \$0.06276/kWh to \$0.07276/kWh.
- The Lee County municipal rate with AEP Energy is fixed at \$0.05634/ kWh. This rate remains in effect through July 2023.



• Owners can opt-out of the Lee County aggregation program at any time without penalty. When this occurs, the Owner can choose another supplier or Com Ed as their supplier. If Com Ed is the chosen supplier, the Owner will be committed to a 6-month contract. At the end of the 6 months,

the owner will have the option of opting into another agreement, including the aggregation agreement.


As shown in this data, the Com Ed supply rates have remained higher than the fixed-rate offered by AEP in the first year of the contract. As we enter the summer season of 2021, the AEP Energy rates will remain lower than the base Com Ed rates for the summer season. Within each annual cycle, Com Ed will post base rates for peak season (June through September) and for non-peak season (October through May). The rates for October 2021 through May 2022 have not been posted at this time. The Association will continue to monitor the energy supply rates applied to Woodhaven properties and provide Owners with updated information to assist in making their energy supply decisions.



#### White-Tailed Deer Management in Illinois

In Illinois, deer management goals are to maintain a healthy and balanced deer herd that will exist indefinitely while providing recreational opportunities. These goals also take into account people's broad range of values and concerns related to crop damage, vehicle accidents and damage to ecosystems.

Management of the deer herd in Illinois is the responsibility of the Division of Wildlife Resources within the Department of Natural Resources. The Division of Wildlife Resources provides leadership to restore, manage and protect deer and other wildlife populations and their habitats.

Deer can easily exceed their carrying capacity in Illinois. Carrying capacity is defined as the number of living organisms an area can support indefinitely without degrading the environment. Illinois' relatively mild winters and abundant food sources available, particularly areas where deer have access to corn and soybeans lends to deer exceeding carrying capacity of an area.

In Illinois, there are no longer populations of large carnivores such as cougars or wolves to keep deer numbers in check. This is where the role of hunting becomes important to help keep deer from becoming overabun-

Keeping deer numbers in check is important because too many deer in an area can cause numerous problems. In agricultural areas, deer can damage crops and orchards. In urban areas, they can quickly wipe out gardens or damage ornamental plants. Increased deer numbers means a greater probability for deer-vehicle accidents.

In natural areas, deer can change the structure of the local plant community. When deer become overabundant they overbrowse, which reduces the regeneration of trees and allows more sunlight to reach the forest floor, thus changing the plant species composition.

Research has shown that deer can cause a reduced diversity of plants. virtually eliminate forest understory, and reduce the reproductive potential of rare plants. This alteration of plant communities also encourages the growth of exotic species, such as garlic mustard, that outcompete other native plants such as trilliums, orchids, and ginseng.

These negative impacts on the vegetation eventually impact the deer themselves because there is no longer sufficient vegetation to provide them with enough food. The negative impacts on plants also negatively impact other species of wildlife that depend on them for food, cover, and nesting sites. In other words, the ecosystem begins to drastically decline, ultimately affecting species diversity.

Finally, a consequence of overabundant deer is disease transmission. Some diseases are spread from deer to deer by direct contact or at contaminated feeding sites. See last months article on CWD for more information.



#### **Dredge Project Completed**



The dredge contractor recently finished up with dredging, which took place on Hidden, Pine and Bluegill lakes. The project began on April 16 with Hidden Lake. Dredge material was pumped to the "geotextile" bags in the section 24 common area. These bags will remain in place until they have thoroughly dewatered over the next several months to a year. Once the material has dried, it will be moved to another location for future use.

Dredge material from Pine and Bluegill Lakes was pumped into the dredge spoils basin located in section 5 near the Sports Core area. This material will remain to dewater until we get to the next dredge project.



The project went well overall. There were some issues with maintaining enough water in the lakes for the dredge to work in the shallower areas. With this spring being drier than "normal," the lakes did not get the recharge from spring rains that were anticipated. In this situation, water was pumped from the nearest lake as well as utilities providing water to maintain lake levels during the project.

There was an estimated 8,000 cubic yards of material removed from the bottom of these 3 lakes. The removal of the accumulated material has created deeper areas in the lakes that were very shallow prior to dredging. The dredge removed 2 "deltas" that had developed in Hidden and Pine lakes at the inlets.



There is some equipment and landscape restoration to be finished in these areas. With the areas being wet, it was decided to hold off until drier conditions came about.

#### **Canada Goose Management Update**

Here is a brief update on the goose nest and egg control for the spring. We managed to locate 17 nests through the season which represented 108 eggs. Last season we located and treated 12 nest and 82 eggs. Our permit from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources allowed up to 60 nests for the season. To date, there are approximately 30-40 goslings that hatched out. Nests were difficult to locate this past nesting season as there were 7-8



#### **ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER**

Woodhaven Utilities is pleased to provide you with its 2021 Consumer Confidence Report for Woodhaven Lakes (public water supply ID-IL1035100), which contains important information about your drinking water. The report summarizes the quality of water Woodhaven provided in 2020 - including details about water sources, what the water at your tap contains, and how it compares to standards set by regulatory agencies. Although the report lists only those regulated substances that were detected in your water, we test for more than what is reported. This report is only a summary of our activities during 2020. If you have any questions about the information in this report, please call Rusty at 815-849-5718.

#### YOUR WATER SOURCE

Woodhaven Utilities water comes from a ground water supply that has two wells. Well #1, is a 1.466-foot deep sandstone well that can produce a continuous flow of 700 gallons of water per minute, or 1,000,000 gallons per day. In 2020, the total amount of water pumped by well #1 was more than 95 million gallons. This well was drilled in 1971. Well #2 is a 1.504 foot deep sandstone well that can produce a continuous flow of 800 gallons of water per minute or 1.1 million gallons per day. In 2020 the amount of water pumped by well #2 was more than 6 million gallons. This well was drilled in 1991.

#### SOURCE WATER ASSESSMENT

The public water supply wells were sampled as part of the Statewide Groundwater Monitoring Network on October 13, 1999 and June 4, 2001. The VOC analyses performed detected no quantifiable levels of organic chemicals in either well. Based on information obtained in a Well Site Survey published by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA), only one potential source of contamination is located within 1,000 feet of one of the wells. The IEPA has determined that the Water Supply's source water is not susceptible to contamination. Furthermore, the IEPA has determined that the Water Supply is not vulnerable to viral contamination. The facility has implemented a wellhead protection program which includes the proper abandonment of potential routes of groundwater contamination and correction of sanitary defects at the water treatment facility. This information will be supplied to the general public through local libraries, community water supplies, and via the internet at http://il.water.usgs. gov/proj/il\_swap/index.html.

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and groundwater wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up

Drinking water, including bottled water, can reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. Iuly is here and summer is too! This month we should start to hear the sound of cicadas "singing" their summer songs. There are many different types of cicada that can be found around the world. They are large insects that eat plant sap and can grow up to 2 inches in length. Some types of cicada come out every year, but there are a few types that are called "periodical cicadas" and they emerge from the ground either every 13 years or 17 years. Cicadas are some of the loudest insects of all, up to 120 decibels. This is the same noise level as a thunderclap or an emergency vehicle siren! The "singing" is made by the males and is created with a special structure called a symbol near the abdominal region. This year is the reemergence of the 17 year cicadas! These cicadas have red eyes, black bodies, red/orange veined wings and legs and are around 34-1 14 inch long. The annual cicadas (dogday cicadas) are slightly larger, have dark green to black bodies and green veined wings. Keep your eyes and ears open to find these unique critters this summer.



**Iuly at the Nature Center:** Did you know that the land Woodhaven sits on was once surrounded by a variety of large wetlands and prairie? Have you ever heard of the Inlet Swamp? **New in Nature: Phenology** is the study of the timing of biological phenomena in nature! To learn more about phenology, revisit this article in the March Woodhaven News. Your family and you can track phenology in your own backyard by starting a nature journal. Keep track of what you see and when, or use a calendar to write your observations in.

July is a slower month for change within nature. At this time trees are full, birds are nesting and raising their young, migration is on hold, baby animals are already on the move and growing up fast! The biggest change we will see is the emergence of a variety of insects. As the temperatures continue to rise and stay warm, we'll find cicadas, dragonflies, mosquitos and more. There will also be more flowers blooming in the prairies and grasslands around the area with their vibrant colors.

During the month of May we hit the height of migration for birds. Several species of warblers, vireos, and other passerines, made their way through the area. Some stayed, built nests, and are raising young while others continued towards Canada for the summer. Many of these birds, especially warblers and hummingbirds, where slow on making their comeback to the area. Many researchers believe this was because of the cooler and drier spring weather we had, which kept insects from hatching out. These insects are an important food source for these birds. Also in May we saw many different woodland wildflowers blooming around the forested areas. Mayapples, trilliums, bluebells, and Solomon's seal made their appearance and are starting to disappear now that the tree canopy is full, which allows less light to hit the forest floor. Baby animals emerged from the nest and we started to see baby rabbits hopping around. On May 31st, we saw a family of baby groundhogs on property. Head outside and enjoy the trails around the area to see what may happen this July in nature! If you see something awesome, stop by the Nature Center and let us know or bring in a picture to add to our photo
