Family Camping Fun

While life may seem as though it was less complicated looking back five decades; people have always had similar personal, social, and economic demands over the years—work, traffic, school, deadlines, and bills. For 50 years, Woodhaven has been a sanctuary from these pressures.

In the second issue of the Woodhaven Newsletter in August 1972, these concerns were addressed on the front page in an article titled "Family Camping Fun".

"We are aware in these troubled times of the need to provide our children with wholesome recreational facilities. So often we hear the words, 'Parents, do you know where your children were last night?' Woodhaven members don't worry, for Woodhaven is fun for the whole family."



"What better place than the green and wooded hills at Woodhaven to explore or just to sit on the banks of one of our many lakes and contemplate. There is fishing, swimming, tennis, horseback riding, canoeing, hiking, bike and minibike trails, ping pong, horseshoes, snowmobiles, playgrounds and complete recreational areas with many activities planned with the young people in mind."

Trees—And Recreation

While most Property Owner associations were traditionally developed as residential communities,

Woodhaven's concept was quite distinct. Woodhaven was primarily conceptualized and developed with one purpose in mind—recreation.

"There are two unique aspects to Woodhaven when compared to most other Property Owner associations—trees and recreation," Jim Blackburn, former Woodhaven General Manager often said.

Both the trees and recreational activities have matured and changed over the years. The one-foot pines that lined the main entrance in early 1970s have grown into a stand of welcoming giants, and many of those early activities have been expanded on and enhanced, while others have become extinct.

Gone, But Not Forgotten

As illustrated above, early 1970s promotional materials and activities fliers touted activities such as minibike trails, a toboggan run and horseback riding. But by the early 1980s the wooden toboggan slide, which was located behind where the current sled hill sits, had deteriorated to the point it became unsafe and it was demolished. Dwindling use of the slide over the years helped management determine it would not need to be rebuilt, which paved the way for the development of the cross-country skiing trails.

"To silently tour through the beautiful Woodhaven scenery covered with a blanket of white snow is the ultimate in beauty," said Lant Huntley, Ski Clinic Director, in the December 1978 <u>Woodhaven News</u>. "Here, at Woodhaven, we believe that learning to cross country ski should be just as much fun as it is easy. Gentle rolling terrain takes you through trails and avails the skier to panoramic views of our lakes in their masquerade of white snow."

While the popularity of cross-country skiing has also waned over the years, these trails are still available for winter skiing in addition to hiking and biking during the summer months.

Dirt Riding and Horsing Around

The Woodhaven Lakes Trail Riders mini-bike club was very popular during early property development. They even had a full, one-page membership application in early editions of the <u>Woodhaven News</u> along with a specific list of published off trail riding rules that, by most accounts, were not followed very well. As more and more lots sold and Phase 2 expansion was completed (where the mini-bike trails were originally located), adequate space for the dirt bikes disappeared and Property Owners complaints about the noise and dirt next to their newly developed lots dramatically increased. Based on these factors, the dirt bike trails were closed, and unlicensed vehicle were ultimately banned from operating in Woodhaven.

As for horseback riding, back in the mid-1980s two local brothers would bring their horses out to Woodhaven for Property Owners and guests to ride at a cost of \$10 for a five-mile, one hour ride.

"We set up an area for their horses at the southwest corner of the common area behind the Service Center (the area currently used to store leaves and fill dirt)," Greg Dimmig, current Director of Maintenance/Resources & Janitorial recollects. "After a few years, they stopped bringing the horses out because one of the brothers got bit in the face by one of the horses, which messed him up pretty bad. I remember Woodhaven looking for another option with no luck."

While many of these early programs are gone, plenty of the recreational events conceived in the early days have survived and thrived. Although many of the winter activities have waned in popularity over the years including cross-country skiing and snowmobiling, the Winter Carnival, started in February 1973, is still a mainstay.

"From 1986, when I started working at Woodhaven to about 1996, it seemed as if there was no snow during the entirety of those winters, much less during Winter Carnival Weekend, and attendance for this annual event plummeted," Tim O'Laughlin, Director of Recreation & Aquatics, recalls.

To help boost turnout, Winter Carnival was rebranded and renamed Cabin Fever Festival and it remains a well-received off-season event along with Spring Fling Weekend and Fall Festival.

Other individual activities Fincluding arts & crafts, live entertainment, various sporting tournaments and family movie nights have survived pretty much unchanged from the dawn of Woodhaven's recreation programming. However, one very popular event over the years, BINGO, was forced to undergo a dramatic change from how it was operated in the early years.

Back in BINGO's heyday, it was not unusual to see 300 people or more stuffed under the BINGO tent on Saturday nights for cash prizes", O'Laughlin remembers. "Because there were so many people, it became difficult for many to hear the numbers called, so a large lighted BINGO board was



purchase to help make the games go smoother and also prevent arguments, which often became very heated."

To offer cash prize BINGO, an extensive "BINGO application" had to be filled out and submitted to the state for a license. In 1989, after reviewing the application, the state determined Woodhaven's organizational structure was not appropriate to issue a BINGO license, thus ending BINGO for cash prizes at Woodhaven. While the Recreation Department still offers "BINGO" a few times a season, there is no cash buy-in involved and winners receive themed prizes instead of a money pot.

Recreating and relaxing at Woodhaven comes in many forms. For some, it is simply a nap in a hammock on a lazy afternoon or even pulling every weed out of the flower beds and gravel driveway. But for many, Woodhaven's scheduled and structured recreational programming for all ages is the draw, and this year's lineup of activities and events takes the cake—with 50 candles on top!

Some highlights of this upcoming summer include an all-star lineup of live musical acts, a BMX bike show, high dive show, Hawaiian Luau, Dock Dogs and four weekends filled with fireworks over Woodhaven's Lake.

FORE! Actually \$5 Per 9-Holes Played

Before we get down to full-fledged business, let us mix a little business and pleasure. At the Board of Director's March 22, 2021 Meeting, they again approved the Shady Oaks Country Club Corporate Discount Agreement for the coming 2021 season.

This agreement provides a partnership between Woodhaven and Shady Oaks that provides Property Owners and/or their guests with a \$5 discount on green fees per 9-hole round. 18-hole rounds receive a \$10 discount.

For all our new Property Owners, Shady Oaks Country Club, located only a few minutes from Woodhaven's front gate on Route 52, is a relatively short, but difficult par 71 course. It features small greens, tight undulating fairways and, perhaps most importantly, a fully stocked clubhouse with all your favorite beverages and snacks (sorry, no discounts on those!)

To take advantage of your Property Owner discount, you MUST provide Shady Oaks staff with a legitimate Woodhaven Association gate pass at the time of check-in. The discount will be applied to the posted daily fee established by Shady Oaks throughout the year, and it is valid on weekdays, weekends, and holidays. 

board action report

The following actions were taken or reported by the Board of Directors at their March 9th, 2021 Meeting. *Full meeting minutes will be posted to the Members tab on our website after approval at the April meeting*

- 1. Motion was made to approve the February 22, 2021 Board of Directors' Meeting Minutes. Motion passed with 6 ayes and 1 abstention.
- 2. Motion was made to approve the February 22, 2021 Board of Directors' Executive Session Meeting Minutes. Motion passed with 6 ayes and 1 abstention.
- 3. Motion was made to uphold the decision of the Environmental Committee to deny the variance for Section 27 Lot 41. Motion passed unanimously.
- 4. Motion was made to suspend the privileges of the Property Owners of Section 13 Lot 12, Section 13 Lot 39, and Section 21 Lots 156 and 157 until they bring trusts into compliance. Motion passed unanimously. (Section 13 Lot 32 was stated at this meeting in error and was corrected at subsequent meeting to Section 13 Lot 12.)
- 5. Motion was made to suspend the privileges for Section 5 Lots 30 and 31 until the membership papers have been completed. Motion passed unanimously.
- 6. Motion was made that eight (8) guest lots will be available at any given time throughout the week/weekend (this is considered 50% occupancy.), guest lot reservations will be open April 15, guest passes WILL NOT be issued until further notice, all five (5) Coast to Coast lots will be offered for rental to Coast to Coast campers beginning April 1, and both guest trailers will be open for the season for internal use only (no Realty guests until further notice.) All these restrictions are subject to change per COVID guidelines. Motion passed unanimously.
- 7. Motion was made to table the discussion and approval of the Main Gate Generator until the March 22, 2021 Board of Directors' Meeting. Motion passed unanimously.
- 8. Motion was made to approve the bid for the detailed topographic survey for the first phase of engineering from Deuchler Engineering Corporation for a cost of \$13,120. Motion passed unanimously.
- 9. Motion was made to establish the Aquatic Operations Referendum Process as an Ad-Hoc Committee and for the Standing Committee Chairpersons to assign two members to this committee. Motion passed unanimously.



Aquatics Facilities Operational Procedures - 2021

The Woodhaven Lakes Aquatics Department operates with a registration process for all three of the swimming facilities; Pool One, Pool Two, and the Beach. With a new "online" reservation system, along with the return of many of the Aquatic programs, we are looking forward to another great summer of relaxation and peace in the warmth of the sun!

The Aquatic Facilities are licensed by the Illinois Department of Public Health and *currently* will be operating under Phase Four Guidance for Swimming Facilities.

Capacity will be limited to 100 patrons at any one time at each of the three Aquatic Facilities. Two (2) groups of 50 will be formed as patrons enter the facility. These groups will be kept separated from each other by thirty (30) feet when not in the water. Patrons in the water must maintain six (6) feet distancing from anyone not in their party.

- Reservations open 24 hours in advance through the online system only. Party limit: 8
- Reservations are for one session, per day, per Sect./Lot, between all three facilities.
- When arriving, a Property Owner's Pass must be presented and your entire party must be present before entering.
- Reservation parties must arrive within the first 15 minutes of their session.
- After checking in, additional reservations may be made if available.
- If available session times exist, walk-up reservations will be accepted only on the day of, and only for that facility.



The Online Reservation System is accessible through the Woodhaven Lakes website: <u>www.woodhavenassociation.com</u>. It is required for all Property Owners to create an account. This account will be used to make reservations for your desired sessions and individuals in your party (limit: 8). The reservation system will open 24-hours in advance for each session.

Regardless of attendance, **all Aquatic Facilities will close every two hours** and patrons will be dismissed from the facility. Bathrooms will **not** be accessible 15 minutes prior to closing as this is when they will be cleaned and sanitized. All furniture, equipment, and structures on the pool deck, along with all high contact areas will be sanitized during the following 15-minute session-switchover, at which time the bathrooms will remain closed. Note! – Use the same lounge chair throughout the time of your visit and do not move the chairs from their locations on deck. All chairs at the Beach must be returned upon your leaving.

All patrons upon entering the facility are required to have their temperature taken and will be denied access if 100° F. or more. At this time and periodically throughout your visit, patrons will be in-person screened verifying no Covid-19 symptoms. Please! Unless you feel 100% healthy and are well hydrated, do not visit the aquatic facilities. If you are experiencing nausea, headaches, diarrhea, cough, and congestion, and/or fever, please do not visit the aquatic facilities or any other public facility. Any patrons arriving intoxicated, or judged to be during their stay, will be asked to leave.

Social Distancing of six feet (6') must be followed at all times. This includes sidewalks and entrances; pool decks, sun shelters, pool stairs, and ladders; and most importantly when in line waiting to use the waterslide or diving board. This also includes accessing and using the swim dock at the Beach.

Masks should be worn by all patrons when not in the water. All patrons should frequently use the hand sanitizer as provided at each of the Aquatic Facilities.



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

DREDGING OF HIDDEN, PINE AND BLUEGILL

The dredge contractor is preparing to begin dredging the week of April 5 on Hidden Lake. This part of the project will utilize geotextile bags for dewatering and holding the sediment. The sediment slurry will be pumped into these bags which are up to 100 feet long. Here the sediment separates from the water. The sedi-

ment will remain in the bags over several months' time for further dewatering and drying. The water from the bags will naturally flow back to Hidden Lake. There is an estimated 3,500 cubic yards of material to be removed from this lake. The dredge contractor estimates being in this lake 7-10 days once pumping begins.



Once this lake is completed, the dredge will move on to Pine Lake. Here dredging will be focused on the back end of the lake where an estimated 2,100 cubic yards of sediment has accumulated from the incoming waters. This material will be pumped into the dewatering basin in section 5 adjacent to the sled hill.

Bluegill Lake will be the final stop for the dredge, where an estimated 2,400 cubic yards of material will be removed. Again most of the sediment in this water body is in the back of the lake. The material from this lake will also be pumped to the dewatering basin in Section 5.

The benefits of dredging these 3 small lakes will be removal of accumulated organic sediment which will add depth to the lake that had been lost. In addition, nutrients contained in the sediment will be removed from the lake systems. The excess nutrients promote weed and algae growth in lakes and ponds.

The "business" end of the dredge. This is the cutter head which rotates and loosens the sediment while the pump sucks the material into the pipeline to be transported to the dewatering site. As you can see the rotating head picks up wire, rope and other material that ends up in the lake.





SOME RESOURCE POINTS TO BE AWARE OF FOR THE COMING SEASON:

- Vacuum leaf pickup runs from April 15 through May 31. Rake leaves and other yard debris, *excluding* sticks, dirt, trash and rocks, to the front of your lot. Brush pickup was opened early this year to help with winter storm clean up; pickup extends through November 30. Stack brush at the front of your lot. Sign up for all landscape waste pickup at the Service Center, Gate, Administration Office, or General Store.
- Keep all fertilizer and pesticide applications away from the lake at least 25 feet as stated in our Rules & Regulations. Better yet apply a fertilizer with no phosphorus in the formulation. Phosphorus is one of the key nutrients leading to excessive growth of nuisance aquatic vegetation. Ask for phosphorus-free fertilizer formulations at garden centers. You can determine the phosphorous content in the ingredient formulation usually found on the front of the bag in the form of 10-0-10. These numbers give the percent of nitrogen (N)-phosphorus (P)-potassium (K) respectively.
- Please do your part by **not feeding the GEESE** or any of the 'wild' animals that visit our property. Report any goose nests you find to the Resource Department at extension 305.
- Fishing licenses expire March 31 of each year. Remember to renew your fishing license for the 2021 season beginning April 1, 2021. Anyone 16 years of age and older actively participating in angling is required to have in possession a current State of Illinois fishing license while on Woodhaven's lakes. The exception to this will be during the period set aside by the State as FREE FISHING DAYS. This period is set for June 18, 19, 20 & 21 for this season. During this period only, anglers will not be required to have any type of sport fishing license. Anglers will be required to follow all other fishing regulations.
- All motorized watercraft (i.e. electric trolling motors) used upon the lakes must be registered with the State of Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR). Registration forms may be acquired from any boat dealer, Department of Natural Resources office, or the preferred method is to register on-line at the IDNR website, www2.illinois.gov/dnr. Owners of non-motorized boats, canoes, kayaks, paddleboats, and paddleboards are no longer required to have a registration or Watercraft Usage Stamp unless they have a motor mounted on them. Boats used upon the lakes are not to exceed 16 feet total length. All watercraft are required to display owner's section/lot numbers on the outside. (Gas powered motors are not allowed on boats when on the lakes even if they are not being used)

- Paddleboards are allowed on the lakes.
- Watercraft storage areas on Bass, Black Oak and Woodhaven Lakes are on a first come, first served basis. Watercraft can only be stored at these locations between March 1 and December 1. All watercraft must be removed from all common access areas during the same time period. Designated lake storage can be found on Bass, Woodhaven and Black Oak Lakes.
- Do not trim oak trees during the active growing season, April-October. Trimming during this time aids in the spread of oak wilt disease.
- As a reminder, residents of Illinois are not allowed to place feed or salt & mineral blocks out to attract deer. This practice was banned by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources a number of years ago due to the outbreak of Chronic Wasting Disease in deer populations in Wisconsin and several Northern Illinois counties. With the continued spread of CWD, it is even more important to refrain from intentionally placing these items out for deer. Any of these found on properties in Woodhaven will be removed!
- The first positive CWD deer was found in southeast Lee County this past fall/winter hunting season. This was approximately 8 miles east of Woodhaven. This is an important reason to begin some type of deer management on property. Deer numbers are high in and around Woodhaven property.

The Bait Shop will be open weekends April and May.

Anyone coming in for fishing licenses please have with you a driver's license/ID, social security number and your expired license. Each person that has purchased a license in the past has associated with it a Customer Identification Number. This number is important when you come to renew your license.

RESOURCE NEW:

ESAC Corner

It is that time of year again when our Property Owners begin implementing the projects they have been planning over the winter months. The following are some questions and answers we hope will be helpful with your construction plans.

When do I need a permit? Any additions, changes to, or relocation of existing improvements requires a permit. When in doubt, contact ESAC. Our office can assist you with the correct permit for your construction. One of ESAC's responsibilities is to be certain improvements to your lot comply with the Rules and Regulations. If you are relocating a structure or "refreshing" or adding gravel to an existing patio, driveway or walkway, ESAC needs to be certain the setback requirements are still met and the gravel area didn't increase. This latter problem can occur for many reasons, including the fact that gravel "travels" if not contained by timbers. What you intend as a top coat of gravel may result in an area which exceeds the permitted square footage or setback requirements. We definitely don't want you to have to remove excess gravel if it can be avoided.

What if I have a question about the Rules and Regulations? The ESAC staff is here to answer your questions and assist you with your construction plans. Friends, neighbors and others at Woodhaven might be happy to answer your questions, but even with the best of intentions, they might not be aware of the current Rules and Regulations. Talking to ESAC first is always a good idea.

What if I want to hire someone to do the work? ESAC maintains a list of contractors who have registered to perform work at Woodhaven. Registered contractors have paid an annual fee and provided proof of liability insurance and Worker's Compensation insurance, if applicable. If you call or visit ESAC, we can provide you with a copy of the list. The list can also be obtained at the ESAC Information Station in the lobby of the Association office, on the Woodhaven website and on Woodhaven's app. Please be advised that the Association cannot guarantee nor be held responsible for the work done or agreements made between you and a contractor. It is recommended you request a detailed written contract with the contractor before any work is done or payment is made. It is always a good idea to request from the prospective contactor, other Property Owners they have conducted business with for a recommendation. The Association in no way recommends one contractor over another.

When is a lot pinning performed? A pinning inspection to locate your property boundary markers is required when a First Class Permit is requested and there has been no pinning or survey within the prior 12 months. You may also request an inspection in conjunction with planned construction or changes to a lot, or simply because you wish to identify your property lines. Requesting a pinning during the construction planning stage is an excellent idea to prevent possible issues delaying your construction.

While one of ESAC's responsibilities is to ensure compliance with the Rules and Regulations as they relate to lot development, we strongly encourage you to look to ESAC for assistance with your plans, the construction process and any questions you might have.

We are already half way through spring with summer on the horizon! While spring brings us beautiful flowers and migrating birds, it also brings baby animals well into early summer. Baby animals are cute and look very cuddly, however, please remember to "leave them be." Nature has a way of raising baby animals and each animal is different on what its needs are. Baby animals are not like baby humans. They are amazing creatures that grow quickly and become young adults most times within one year. Think about the comparisons: many



baby animals are able to walk/move within the first few weeks to a month and baby birds some within one to two months, while baby humans take 9+ months. Some animal parents leave their babies for 23 hours at a time, while we would never completely leave a baby human alone for any length of time. This is because animal parents are trying to protect their young. By leaving them alone for long periods of time, it keeps the baby from having a smell that could attract predators or having predators follow them. When humans come in contact with a baby animal we also leave a scent that could be followed. Animal parents leave their babies in a secure location knowing that the baby will be there when they come back. If we (humans) move them to "save them" that animal parent will be frantic wondering what has happened (how would you feel?). So, what do we do? We can watch baby animals from a distance, experience the wonders of nature and learn from it. If you believe an animal is injured or left alone, after observing and waiting (potentially up to a day) then contact an animal rehabilitator for next steps. Usually around Mother's Day is a great time to enjoy both the birds and the blooms!

By March 8th the robins and juncos were singing their spring songs and turkey vultures had migrated back to the area from their southern winter grounds.
