BOARD MESSAGE



My name is Laura Packwood, and I have been one of your elected Board of Directors for more than 6 years now. I also serve as the Committee Chair of our Finance Committee and the Woodhaven Lakes Audit Committee. I have been going out to Woodhaven since the mid 70s; I was 12 years old the first time I arrived with my friends family, so I have seen the changes that have come to pass over the decades. I remember my first experience of sleeping in a pop-up and waking up to a screechy bird around the campsite. - Do not bring firewood from the outside. Even though it seems trivial and harmless, doing so can bring in diseases from outside trees and infect Woodhaven's own beautiful trees.
- If you're planning on making any improvements to your property, please make sure you check in with ESAC in the office FIRST. No one wants to get that 'letter' in the mail!
- Do not put unacceptable materials in the trash containers around the park. Woodhaven has a specific site at the Maintenance Building, near Woody's Hardware Store, that you can drop off things like, white goods (refrigerators, stoves, micro-waves etc.), old furniture, etc.
- Speed limit is 20 mph on all roadways in the park and scooters and LSVs are not allowed on ANY of the trail systems. Please make sure any guests you have come out to visit are aware of these rules.

Lastly, let's not forget the all-important 'WOODHAVEN WAVE'! Yes, it IS a thing! When you're passing your fellow Property Owners, whether in a car, LSV, scooter, or bicycle, give them the wave! It will definitely make them smile! Here's to a great 2023 camping season and if you see me around, don't forget to say "Hi!"

Just as baseball pitchers slowly and methodically warm up their arms during spring for the long season ahead; Woodhaven's Main Gate arms follow a similar schedule, culminating in a marathon session every year on Memorial Day Weekend. Woodhaven's average Memorial Day Weekend attendance over the past five years is 13,947. Now that's a lot of (mostly) happy campers packed into Woodhaven for one weekend! It's during these busy summer weekends that the importance of the Rules & Regulations really comes into focus.



We know, some believe there are way too many rules for "just a campground." But Woodhaven is much more than "just a campground" and we believe that a weekend population of almost 14,000 campers reinforces that—and justifies the need for clear and concise rules to help govern and maintain a sense of security and order, especially during these busy times. While Woodhaven's Rules and Regulations were initially adopted in the early 1970s during Woodhaven's infancy, they have developed and evolved over time to conform to the needs of the current climate and overall community needs.



As a Woodhaven Owner, it is important to have a general idea and understanding of Woodhaven's Rules and Regulations and know where to find them when you need clarification. Woodhaven's governing documents can be found on Woodhaven's website and on our mobile app. You can also pick up a copy at the

Association Office, and they are printed annually in the Woodhaven News. It's especially important for you as an Owner to relay all relevant Rules and Regulations to your family members or guests, especially when they are out at Woodhaven enjoying time when you are not with them on property. Please remember, your guests are YOUR responsibility while enjoying Woodhaven, whether you are here with them or not. And that is also why it is extremely important to know who has access to your property passes and when they are using your property.

As times continue to change, so do the needs of Woodhaven. As stated in Article VII, Section 1 of Woodhaven's By-Laws, "The Board of Directors shall: c. Adopt such rules and regulations relating to the use of Association property, as it may deem reasonably necessary for the best interest of the Association and its Membership." Woodhaven's Board of Directors reviews the Rules and Regulations annually to determine Woodhaven's most up-to-date needs and how they relate to our Rules and Regulations. Several changes were recommended by the Board this past spring and those changes were adopted at their April 11, 2023, meeting. The most notable change was the allowable size of a single shed increased from 96 sq. ft. to 128 sq. ft. Two sheds are still allowed on each lot; however, the maximum combined size remains 128 sq. ft. total. Another potential rule change, after much discussion and debate, will allow the use of Class 1 e-bikes within Woodhaven. This specific change has not been formally adopted yet, but if or when it does, a full copy of the updated Rules and Regulations will be included in an upcoming issue of the *Woodhaven News*.

Mother Nature Strikes Again!

We believe Mother Nature recognizes the natural beauty of Woodhaven as we all do; but sometimes when she visits our tranquil getaway, she is in a real gnarly mood! Such was the case on March 31 when she chose to visit in the form of an EF2 tornado. While there was significant tree and personal property damage, it was definitely more concentrated and did not rise to the levels of damage we experienced in 2015. Regardless, the cleanup process for Association common areas and those of you who experienced personal property and tree damage on your lots will take time, and there will certainly be challenges along the way. The areas with the most concentrated damage were Section 1, Section 15, and Section 16; and a total of 520 lots experienced some form of storm damage. The damage totals break down as follows:

- 447 lots with downed trees
- 65 lots with downed branches
- 168 lots with damaged RVs
- 23 lots with damaged room additions
- 85 lots with damaged sheds
- 55 lots with damaged decks
- 5 lots with damaged vehicles

Following the storm, most roads were cleaned, opened or passable within a day. Common ground and commercial building damage included the loss of a storage building at the water treatment plant, damage to the mini golf course fence, loss of the watercraft rental building and its contents, damage to rental boats, damage to the retaining wall at the Lakeside Building, and the loss of many trees in common areas.

Due to the volume of tree debris generated from the storm, a tub grinder was rented, and the area behind the General Store was again utilized to grind the excess material into chips. The wood chips were hauled away by the contractor for a discounted rental fee of the tub grinder. Once we got past the initial onslaught of tree debris removal, the remaining tree debris is now being hauled to the Maintenance compound to be burned or processed into firewood. Our initial cleanup focus was on the high traffic and heavily accessed common areas. There may still be trails and other lightly used common areas where cleanup is required, and we expect tree cleanup in common areas to continue well into summer.

We realize it may take some time for you to clean up your property if you sustained damage from the storm. We do ask that you stay in regular contact with the ESAC Department with regards to your cleanup plans and the timeframe for completion. Also understand that hazard trees and personal property damage that are a potential danger to yourself or surrounding Owners are a priority, and we request those situations be addressed as soon as possible. If we continue to work together and remain "Woodhaven Strong", we will be able to put this unfortunate event in the rear-view mirror just as we've done in the past.

Golfing Outside and Inside of Woodhaven

One of the many great benefits of owning at Woodhaven, especially if you or your family also enjoys the game of golf, is discounted rounds at Shady Oaks Country Club. Woodhaven Owners are provided a \$5 discount per nine holes off Shady Oaks lowest advertised rate. This discount also applies to family and friends who join you during your round or present your Woodhaven pass when they

play. Woodhaven has a great relationship with Shady Oaks and they truly understand the importance and value that you, the Woodhaven golfer, provide to their overall success.

Shady Oaks is also a great place to introduce and teach the game to your children as kids 13 and under play for free with a paying adult. And even if you don't play the game yourself, you can still take your children out and introduce them to the game with \$5 three-hole or \$7 six-hole rates.

Please know, to take advantage of these great discounts, you MUST provide your Property Owner Pass when checking in at the clubhouse. This is important for Shady Oaks to verify that those receiving a discount are Property Owners (or your family and/or guests) and help us track the number of rounds played every year under the corporate discount agreement. It sounds like Shady Oaks also has many great special events planned for this coming season, so check out their website or ad in the *Woodhaven News* for more information.

If the real game of golf just isn't your thing, Woodhaven has a great game option right here on property. Last spring, the 18-hole Winding Trail Disc Golf Course was installed in the open area behind the RecPlex and General Store. Concrete tee box areas were installed in late fall to complete the course construction.

Golf discs can be rented or purchased at the RecPlex mini-golf window. There is no rental fee, however, a \$10 deposit is required.

If you don't want to put up cash, you can also leave your Property Owner pass with staff until the disc or discs are returned. If you own your own discs, there is no need to check in at the Rec Plex to play the course and there is a box on the first tee with course score-cards available. Just through observations, the disc golf course got quite a bit of play last year, and we anticipate usage will continue to grow. Watch for more information on special events and tournaments for the coming season.

Other News and Notes

- We have entered into an agreement for electric supply services with Dynegy beginning with the December 2023 billing period. The rate is fixed for 2 years at \$0.06432/kWh. This will be an increase of about 14.8% over the current rates. This rate is competitive with the current offerings and represented the best available option as of the date the agreement was signed.

- The insurance claims review of the employee theft claim has been completed. Woodhaven received a payment in February, minus the \$2,500 deductible, of \$52,740. An additional payment of \$222,225 was received at the end of March. Staff also met with the forensic audit team, hired by the insurance company, and believe the remaining amount of \$55,500 will be settled soon. A pretrial status hearing in the criminal case is scheduled for early May.

For more information on meeting dates and times, please refer to the Woodhaven calendar on our website or you may give us a call at the Association Office. Applications will be accepted through May 15th, and Owners applying for these positions are required to go through a file review as part of the consideration process.

In addition to the Standing Committees, the Woodhaven Board of Directors is also accepting applications to fill a vacancy on the Environmental Committee. Members interested in serving on this Committee can use the same application form, which offers an opportunity to state the Committee each Owner is interested in serving on.

The Environmental Committee is a decision-making Committee of the Association receiving its authority from the Declaration of Covenants, Article VI. Members meet only when needed to review variance requests made by Property Owners. Variance requests are submitted through Woodhaven's ESAC Department, and the Committee consists of 3 members appointed by the Board of Directors. Additional information on the objectives and structure of this Committee is available in Policy 03-210-113.

1. Motion was made to approve the February 16, 2023 – Board of Directors’ Meeting Minutes. Motion passed with 6 ayes and 1 abstention.
2. Motion was made to approve the February 16, 2023 – Board of Directors’ Executive Session Minutes. Motion passed with 6 ayes and 1 abstention.
3. Motion was made to add under New Business, item 5. Board of Director’s Meeting Dates. Motion passed unanimously.
4. Motion was made to approve the changes to Article II. Use of Motorized Vehicles Section 1 G 2: “All Class 2 and Class 3 low-speed electric bicycles are prohibited from operating within Woodhaven” and to publish the eBike rule changes in the April *Woodhaven News*. Motion passed unanimously.
5. Motion was made to approve the Shady Oaks Corporate Discount Agreement. Motion passed unanimously.

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RESTRICTED MATERIALS PROCEDURES

In order to provide Owners a way to dispose of restricted items in the refuse industry, we have provided roll off dumpsters at the Maintenance Shop; dumpsters are accessible 24/7. Please make note of limits and pricing. Items that have a fee will need to be paid for at the Association Office prior to being taken to the dumpsters.

Materials we will accept

Appliances(white goods): Refrigerators, freezers, ranges, water, heaters, air conditioners, and humidifiers; **1 per lot**

Electronics: laptops/monitors/keyboards; **3 per lot, \$5 per item**

TVs: 1 per lot, \$25

Microwaves: 1 per lot, \$5

Propane Tanks: 20 pound cylinders only; **1 per lot**

Concrete: We will accept a wheelbarrow-sized load or smaller

Furniture: We will accept all furniture unless it is determined to be a health hazard; **3 per lot**

Metals: Large; **1 per lot** | Small; **5 per lot**

Large - lawn mowers, grills, swing sets, patio sets

Small - lawn chairs, lawn ornaments, bird feeders

Construction/Demolition Debris: we will only accept small amounts, for example, a wheelbarrow-sized load; **limit 1 load per lot**, or bring extra loads at a cost of \$5.00 per wheelbarrow load. The material must be clean, no nails, spikes, staples, etc.

Property Owners are required to obtain their own container from a waste hauler for construction or demolition projects generating larger amounts of debris.

Materials we will NOT accept

Hazardous chemicals: paint thinner, turpentine, herbicides, pesticides, fertilizers, etc- contact your local recycler

Liquids of any kind: anti freeze, fuels, etc – contact your local O'Reilly's, AutoZone, or car service center

Oils: motor oil, vehicle lubricants, cooking oils, etc- contact your local O'Reilly's, AutoZone, Tire/Lube Center

Unsolidified paint: Oil based: contact your local recycler, Latex: cat litter or paint hardener to solidify (available at Woody's True Value)

Tires: Contact your local tire dealer

Batteries: Contact your Home Depot, Staples, etc.

Fluorescent bulbs: contact your local Home Depot, Lowes, or Battery Plus Bulbs center

Any of the above items that are brought to the drop-off will be marked by staff so their origin can be identified if found in an outlet or in or near a garbage container.

NOTICE

UNACCEPTABLE MATERIALS AT THE LANDFILL

DO NOT DISPOSE OF THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN THE GARBAGE CONTAINERS:

- Appliances
- Batteries
- Hazardous Chemicals- Paint thinner, turpentine, mercury, etc.
- Oils- Vehicle lubricants/fluids, undrained filters, etc.
- Full Paint Cans
- Landscape Waste
- Construction Debris- Roofing material, block, lumber, railroad ties, etc.
- Electronic Equipment- Computers, TVs, monitors, printers, stereos, cell phones, etc.
- Liquids of any kind- AntiFreeze, fuels, etc
- Unsolidified Paint
- Tires
- Propane Tanks
- Fluorescent Lamps (contain mercury)
- Concrete

The above items listed, with the exception of construction debris, are NOT accepted in landfills. Those that may have construction debris will need to acquire an appropriate container suitable for these items from a disposal company. With warmer weather on the horizon, most Property Owners are looking forward to returning to Woodhaven to begin another fun-filled camping season. A few things to keep in mind when you are returning to your campsite for the first time:

1. Make sure to check your sewer line to make sure it has not come loose or disconnected during the winter months. We also recommend checking your flexible sewer line to make sure there are no holes or tears in the line. Flex lines tend to become brittle over time and are prone to cracking and splitting.
2. Check your RV cord to make sure the covering has not become frayed, creating exposed wires. As with flexible sewer lines, the covering can become brittle over time.
3. Check the windows and doors of your RV, room, and shed. Settling frequently causes stress cracks in windows. The shifting and settling of the structures can make the doors bow and prevent them from closing properly.
4. Check for deteriorated wood on your sheds and rooms. The winters at Woodhaven can be brutal, and wood that was just weathered last year could have deteriorated further over the winter. A little maintenance now can help prevent further damage down the road.

5. Along with checking for deteriorated wood, you should also check for any signs of animal activity around or under your structures, specifically holes in skirting. Animals tend to burrow under structures when looking for a warm, safe sanctuary from the winter cold.
6. Make sure to check your trees for any damage or hanging branches. Snow, ice, and wind over the winter months can wreak havoc on vegetation, and the last thing any of us wants is to have a branch fall on your property and cause damage to your structures or cause injury to anyone.

As for cleaning up your property, leaves and brush can be raked to the front of your lot and will be removed by the Maintenance Department. Vacuum pickup is temporarily postponed for storm damage clean up. Brush pick up will continue until further notice. Brush removed at the Association Office, Woody's True Value, Woody's General Store, the Main Gate or through the App. You must sign up to have the brush removed.

Resource Points To Be Aware Of For The Coming Season

- **Vacuum leaf pickup runs from April 15 through May 31.** Rake leaves and other yard debris, excluding sticks, dirt, trash, and rocks, to the front of your lot. Brush pickup will begin on April 15 and extend through November 30. Stack brush at the front of your lot. Sign up for all landscape waste pickup at the Service Center, Gate, Administration Office, or General Store.
- **Please do your part by not feeding the GEESE or any of the ‘wild’ animals that visit our property.** Report any goose nests you find to the Resource Department at extension 305. In addition, residents of Illinois are not allowed to place feed or salt/mineral blocks out to attract deer. This practice was banned by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources in 2002 to slow the spread of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) within the state of Illinois. With CWD continuing to spread, it is important to STOP intentionally placing any type of feed out for deer. Any of these found on properties in Woodhaven will be removed! Please help to stop the spread of this disease by not placing these items out on property.
- **Keep all fertilizer and pesticide applications away from the lake a minimum of 25 feet as stated in our Rules & Regulations. Better yet, apply a fertilizer with no phosphorus in the formulation.** Phosphorus is one of the key nutrients leading to excessive growth of nuisance aquatic vegetation. Ask for phosphorus-free fertilizer formulations at garden centers. You can determine the phosphorous content in the ingredient formulation usually found on the front of the bag in the form of 10-0-10. These numbers give the percent of nitrogen (N)-phosphorus (P)-potassium (K) respectively.
- **Be aware that beavers are in the waters surrounding our property and do migrate, so Property Owners need to protect their valued trees along/near the lakes.** These animals can show up at any time on any lake. The Resource Department makes an effort to trap beaver and muskrat during the designated State trapping season in the fall each year to control these animals.
- **Fishing licenses expire on March 31 of each year. Remember to renew your fishing license for the 2023 season beginning April 1, 2023.** Anyone 16 years of age and older actively participating in angling is required to have in their possession a current State of Illinois fishing license while on Woodhaven’s lakes. The exception to this will be during the period set aside by the State as FREE FISHING DAYS. This period is set for June 16, 17 18 and 19 for this season. During this period only, anglers will not be required to have any type of sport fishing license. Anglers will be required to follow all other fishing regulations.
- **All motorized watercraft i.e. electric trolling motors used upon the lakes must be registered with the State of Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR).** Registration forms may be acquired from any boat dealer, Department of Natural Resources office, or the preferred method is to register on-line at the IDNR website, www2.illinois.gov/dnr. Owners of non-motorized boats: canoes, kayaks, paddleboats, and paddleboards do not require any registration. Boats used upon the lakes are not to exceed 16 feet total length. Paddleboards are allowed on the lakes. All watercraft are required

to display owner’s section/lot numbers on the outside. Gas powered motors are not allowed on boats when on the lakes even if they are not being used.

- **Watercraft storage areas on Bass, Black Oak and Woodhaven Lakes are on a first come first serve basis.** Watercraft can only be stored at these locations between March 1 and December 1. All watercraft must be removed from all storage areas and common ground December 1 to March 1 each season.
- **Refrain from trimming oak trees during the active growing season, April-October.** Trimming during this time aids in the spread of oak wilt disease.

Bait Shop Information

The Bait Shop will be open weekends only, April up to Memorial Day Weekend. There will be additional hours for Spring Fling weekend.

- Saturdays: 8 a.m. – 4 p.m.
- Sundays: 9 a.m. – 3 p.m.

The bait machine will continue to be stocked with bait and tackle for your convenience outside of bait shop hours.



Anyone coming in for fishing licenses, please have with you a driver’s license/ID, social security number or your expired fishing license. Each person that has purchased a license in the past has associated with them a Customer Identification Number. This number makes issuing a new license much faster and does not require providing a social security number. If you don’t have your old license, we can still issue you a license using the other forms of identification.

Bass Lake Stream Restoration Project

The stream restoration part of the project was completed as of March 21. There will be some final grading and seeding when conditions are conducive for this part of the project. I am impressed with the progress they made given the day-to-day conditions in this area. The overall look of the area has improved tremendously. With some recent heavy rains, the stream handles the water moving through much better now.



Figure 1 shows finished stream restoration section below culvert under Woodhaven Drive East looking at the area between sections 8 & 9.

Weather will continue to be key in the completion of this project as we move into the final phase of seeding the areas. The area will be seeded with a “native” seed mix suited for the conditions found at this site. The mix will contain grasses, sedges and flow-

ering plants that have deep roots to aid in stabilizing soils and benefiting a variety of wildlife species. In addition, the planting will provide an aesthetically pleasing view for those surrounding the area and driving by on Woodhaven Drive.

Deer Population

A fourth population survey was conducted in March 2023 by staff traversing the original route (Figure 4) that was set up by the United States Department of Agriculture-Wildlife Services (USDA-WS) in April 2022. The fol-

lowing are the summarized results of all the counts that have been conducted to date.

- April 5, 2022: (conducted by USDA-WS)
 - » 163 deer counted.
 - » 187 (with the standard 15% correction factor to account for deer not seen)
 - » 77 deer/square mile on Woodhaven property
- January 18, 2023: (conducted by Woodhaven staff)
 - » 219 deer counted.
 - » 252 (with the 15% correction)
 - » 103 deer/square mile on Woodhaven property
- February 9, 2023: (conducted by Woodhaven staff)
 - » 294 deer counted.
 - » 338 (with the 15% correction)
 - » 139 deer/square mile on Woodhaven property.
- March 14, 2023: (conducted by Woodhaven staff)
 - » 255 deer counted.
 - » 293 (with the 15% correction)
 - » 120 deer/square mile
 - » 23 deer were counted off-property, not included in the above numbers.

The most recent count conducted on March 14 continued with high numbers of deer being counted on property. Survey counts will inevitably be influenced by factors such as weather, time of day, and location of deer relative to the route. Considering the deer present but not seen during the surveys is the 15% correction factor used which

was used by the USDA-WS in the first survey. For consistency, we are continuing to use this factor. This is a standard correction in wildlife surveys. Counts will continue to be taken periodically to assess the population which will provide a better estimate of the population and trends over time.

A healthy number of deer per square mile recommended by wildlife biologists in most areas is 20-30/square mile. Thus far the counts are exceeding this by a substantial margin. Because of the impacts large numbers of deer have on the health of the population, natural areas, and properties, wildlife resource managers believe that in these situations control should be implemented to reduce the numbers. Harvest of female deer is most important to successful deer management. If females are not removed, a deer population has the potential to double every other year. Imagine where our deer numbers might be in 4 years.

Deer Exclusion Structures

You may see these structures while out walking the trails around property. These structures have been placed out in 6 locations to monitor deer browsing in these areas over the coming season. Over browsing in our natural areas can be detrimental to vegetation that grow in these areas especially regeneration of young trees that should be growing to replace older trees.



Please do not disturb these structures as they will be monitored on a regular basis to assess growth inside the fencing. These structures measure 4 ft x 6 ft. If you find one damaged, please contact the Resource Department at extension 305.

Fish Catch Limits Adjusted

We have revised the current catch limits on the lakes, most notably on Woodhaven and Bass Lakes, beginning this season. I have mentioned the need for catch limit changes in past [Woodhaven News](#) articles as to the reasons for the changes. Imbalanced largemouth bass populations in these two lakes where there are low numbers of bass over the 14-inch size. This could be attributed to overharvesting of these larger fish. To correct this, we have implemented changes to help the fishery recover to achieve the goal of improving the fishery resources in our lakes in order to provide a higher quality angling experience to members and guests in the future.

With the approved upgrade for replacing the existing catch limit signage scheduled for this season, it was an opportune time to move ahead with these changes. New signage will be placed at the main entry points of the lakes with the lake name and all rules pertaining to fishing.

The catch limit changes are based on fish surveys conducted in the recent past as well as conversations with anglers. The survey results indicated that the largemouth bass populations in both Woodhaven and Bass Lakes were not well balanced in terms of bass 14 inches and over. This would indicate a high degree of harvest on fish over 14 inches. On the other hand, these two lakes had more than adequate populations of fish under 12 inches. To address this imbalance, the catch limit has been temporarily changed so anglers will be allowed to take up to 3 fish under 12 inches but any fish 12 inches and larger will be required to be released back into the lake. This change will allow some of the smaller bass to be culled out of the lake so that the remaining bass grow faster into the over 12-inch size range.

By removing some of the smaller bass in the populations, there will be more forage for the remaining bass to feed and grow. Over time, we should see improvement in the numbers of fish over 14 inches in the population.

The largemouth bass catch limit will remain as is, 1 fish/day, 14-inch minimum length, on the remainder of the lakes: Pine, Sunset, Black Oak, Hidden and Bluegill.

As stated above, the largemouth bass catch limit change on Woodhaven and Bass Lakes will be temporary meaning at a future point based on future survey results and angler feedback, the catch limit could be adjusted. The key is not to overharvest the smaller sizes of bass so we will need to keep an eye on the populations and make adjustments if need be. Again, the overall objective is to balance the smaller vs larger bass in the lakes.

In addition, the bluegill and redear sunfish population catch limits are being adjusted on all lakes to a 15 fish combined daily limit. Over the years, there were no limits on these species. Bluegill and redear species are most sought after by many anglers during the season as well as during ice cover. This is an aggregate limit meaning an angler can have a combination of bluegill and redear in possession, but the total of these two species combined cannot exceed 15 fish. Again, this is geared toward balancing these species in the lakes and protecting them from overharvest. The main desire for a good sunfish population is to maintain an adequate number of larger fish over 8 inches in the population. This has been shown in studies to ensure that the population does not become "stunted." I would encourage anglers to release some of those larger 8 inch plus bluegill and redear.

Other changes to note are as follows:

- No harvesting of turtles
- 2 poles and line only in water at any time
- No unattended fishing devices are allowed on any of the lakes.
- No trotline or jug fishing on any of the lakes

A summary of the catch limits is as follows:

1. Woodhaven Lake - Allow harvest of largemouth bass up to 3 fish under 12 inches and "Catch & Release" on fish 12 inches and greater.
2. Bass Lake - Allow harvest of largemouth bass up to 3 fish under 12 inches and "Catch & Release" on fish 12 inches and greater.
3. Pine, Sunset, Black Oak, Hidden & Bluegill Lakes – 1 largemouth bass/day 14 inch minimum length limit.
4. All Lakes - 15 fish combined catch limit on bluegill and redear species.
5. All Lakes – 15 fish limit on crappie
6. All Lakes – 4 fish limit on channel catfish.
7. All Lakes – return grass carp to the lake if caught
8. All Lakes – No limit on common carp, bullhead, and green sunfish species.
9. All Lakes – NO MINNOWS: using live minnows can introduce unwanted species/organisms into our lakes.
10. No harvesting of turtles. This is geared mainly towards snapping turtles in which populations have been declining in the State over the years due to overharvesting.
11. Implement 2 poles and lines only in the water at a time for all the lakes on property. Currently, no limit on the number of poles and lines used at one time. With this restriction, anglers would be allowed to have multiple poles but only 2 lines in the water at a given time.
12. No unattended fishing devices are allowed at any time on any of the lakes. Unattended devices can cause mortality to fish and turtles that should be released if undersize as well as interfere with boaters using the lakes.
13. No trotline or jug fishing on any of the lakes. Given our fisheries are recreational, I believe these devices are damaging to our fisheries and interfere with boaters using the lakes.

CHAPEL IN THE WOODS

Chapel in the Woods began right after the development of Woodhaven Lakes. Meeting first at the "Round-Up", then on the "Hillside," and now at the Pavilion. Chapel services are held at 10 a.m. each Sunday from Memorial Day Weekend through Labor Day Weekend. Each service has different speakers and music specials. Look for the CITW summer schedule on the bulletin boards around Woodhaven. Bring your family and friends to the first Chapel Music Special, May 28, to hear our vocal artist, Cami Shrock from Greentown, Indiana.

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LOCAL HIGHLIGHTS - FRANKLIN CREEK CONSERVATION ASC.

Franklin Creek Conservation Association is a local non-profit dedicated to promoting, conserving, and appreciating the natural area of Franklin Creek through stewardship, education, partnerships, and community engagement. This group has been



around for 40 years and is responsible for helping create the trail system and facilities in Franklin Creek State Natural Area (FCSNA), fundraising and building the Franklin Creek Grist Mill and gifting it to the FCSNA, and more recently, purchasing and restoring land to increase FCSNA. FCCA also owns Franklin Creek Headwaters, an 80-acre natural area with a hiking trail just west of Franklin Grove. Each year, FCCA raises money to continue to operate the Grist Mill, restore and acquire land for preservation near Franklin Creek, provide free educational programming, and continue to make Franklin Creek State Natural Area and owned land ecologically healthy and accessible.

FCCA operates the Franklin Creek Grist Mill on donations with the help of one staff member and volunteer docents. It is open to the public Saturdays and Sundays 12 p.m. to 4 p.m. from April to October and additionally on Fridays 12 p.m. to 4 p.m. June, July, and August. The Grist Mill is a beautifully crafted ADA accessible timber-framed building reminiscent of Mills of the time with modern amenities. This is your one stop shop where you can get information about FCSNA, learn about the importance of Franklin Creek Woodlands, learn why Grist Mills are important, and see grinding demonstrations on the last Saturday of the month. The Mill also has a gift shop where you can purchase souvenirs from your trip and a rental space for events.

If you're looking for a new adventure outside, we also have two free nature hikes every month and hold outdoor events and workdays periodically throughout the year. Guided hikes are great for those who want to explore Franklin Creek State Natural Area and see the cave, natural springs, prairie, creek, and woodlands that make this area unique. If you rather enjoy it by yourself, Franklin Creek State Natural Area is open from dawn to dusk almost year-round. Trails are only closed during firearm deer hunting season. At FCSNA, you can hike with your family, fish in the pond, cool off in the creek, picnic under the oak canopy, and more! Be adventurous and head to Whipple's Cave, see prairie restoration in action at the Seasons of Change Trail, or take a leisurely stroll on our Storybook Trail, there are over 900 acres and 15 miles of trails to explore.

Happy May Day! May 1st is the halfway point to Summer and has long been celebrated in England. May Day, like many early holidays, was rooted in agriculture. Springtime festivals were held to celebrate times like this midday festival, or when planted fields were starting to sprout, and many people would fill the day with song and dance to celebrate. The English tradition of May Day includes children dancing around a maypole while holding onto colorful ribbons and people gathering wildflowers, creating baskets of flowers, floral hoops and hair garlands, and crowning a May king and queen. Today, some traditions continue with creating a May basket; making a paper basket or cone and placing a bouquet of spring flowers in it. Then they would leave the basket on each other's doorsteps



anonymously or they might knock and yell "May basket" then run. If the recipient caught the giver, they would be entitled to a kiss. Try making a May Day basket for your family or friends. Use a piece of paper folded into the shape of a cone and fill it with candy, flowers, or make some paper flowers to go inside. When I was a kid, my grandma and I would use pieces of wrapping paper or wallpaper scraps for the basket and fill them with violets to give to family members and friends!

Nature Nuggets: Let's take a closer look at local nature!

This month we'll focus on a local spring woodland wildflower: Mayapple (*Podophyllum peltatum*). The plant's leaves can be found popping up in early April and starting to flower in May in woodland areas throughout all of Illinois. Mayapples are found in parts of Woodhaven Lakes. This plant can be found in the eastern half of the United States as far west as Kansas. It requires rich, moist, deciduous woods, not pines.

Mayapples have unique umbrella-shaped leaves that grow up to 1-1.5 feet tall and 6-8 inches wide. These leaves are extremely lobed. There are two forms of the plant; infertile plants produce one umbrella-leaf from the stalk and fertile plants produce two umbrella-leaves from the stalk. Fertile plants are the ones to produce flowers and fruits at the intersection of the two leaves.



A single waxy, white, nodding flower will bloom with 6-9 petals creating a flower of 1.5-inch width. Flowers resemble apple-blossoms and are short-lived with a pleasant fragrance. After the flower has bloomed, an apple-shaped fruit is produced. Mayapple leaves often last into early autumn. Flowers are cross-pollinated by bumblebees and other long-tongued bees. They collect pollen and may feed on nectar.



Mayapple berries are edible by local wildlife when fully ripe, mainly eaten by box turtles, opossums, raccoons, and skunks. However, the foliage, seeds, and rhizomes of the Mayapple have poisonous qualities to mammalian herbivores. Seeds are distributed to new locations in the feces of animals.

Fun fact: Mayapples have long-rhizomatous root systems that produce dense colonial colonies of this plant in areas of woodlands. They are easy to identify and there is no other plant that looks similar within the state. Mayapple is also known as Indian Apple and Wild Mandrake.
