• If you're planning on making any improvements to your property, please make sure you check in with ESAC in the office FIRST. No one wants to get that 'letter' in the mail!

- Here's one a lot of people either don't know or don't see on the sign at the comfort stations. Do not put unacceptable materials in the trash containers around the park. Woodhaven has a specific site at the Maintenance Building, near Woody's hardware store, where you can drop off things like white goods (refrigerators, stoves, microwaves, etc.), old furniture, and electronics. (Please pay for fee items at the office bfore dropping off.) See page 37.
- While there are signs posted around the park and it's on our passes, the speed limit is 20 mph on all roadways in the park.
- I know kids might think it would be fun to drive your scooter or LSV, but remember, they must be licensed drivers. And at no time are scooters and LSVs allowed on ANY of the trail systems.

- It's really important that our guests coming out to enjoy the park and amenities, are aware of these rules, after all, they don't know what they don't know either and we don't want anyone getting in trouble for something they didn't know

was first introduced to Woodhaven in the amanders. summer of 1976 between his junior and senior years at Amboy High School, working as both a part-time gate attendant and assistant to the extensive sales staff of Woodhaven's development company.

"Back then, there were 50 different saleshad to know all of them by name, and greet front of potential clients" Rick remembers. road." "When one salesman named Jack came through with potential buyers, we were required to loudly greet him with 'Hi, Jack!' He would wryly respond with 'Just don't say that on an airplane!', and we all had to laugh in front of his clients like it was the first time we heard that awful joke."

In addition to his gate attendant duties, Rick would help dole out gifts to potential purchasers, which were one of the benefits of taking a Woodhaven tour with a sales- and Ellah. person. Along with a \$5.00 gas card, which went a long way in 1976, tour-takers also including knife sets, barbeque utensils, grills, and even bowling balls. The gifts were stored in a trailer in the parking lot of where the current Nature Center is located.

"At some point in those early days, someone broke into the trailer where all the gifts were stored, and stole all of the bowler did find out who stole them, one part of aftermath of the tornado. the mystery was solved several years later when the small pond in Section 15 by the water plant was drained for maintenance and all the bowling balls were found on the bottom of the pond!"

When Rick graduated from high school years, in 1980, Rick decided to move on

After a four-year hiatus and a brief stint of being unemployed, Rick returned to Woodhaven on March 1, 1984, again as a full-time dispatcher for Public Safety, while he also worked to obtain his EMT license, so he could also be used as a patrol officer. After about a year, Rick was promoted to Patrol Sergeant, working the afternoon

"But one other memorable night, I came up on Woodhaven Drive near Mike's Pond, and the road appeared to be moving slowly from side to side. I thought I was over-tired and hallucinating. I got out to inspect people working on the weekends, and we and an entire portion of the road was filled with thousands of salamanders of all sizes. > Another memorable encounter happened during the summer of 1987, when a cute red head named Penny, working in the Recreation Department for the summer, caught Rick's eye. Apparently, Rick caught Penny's eye too, because they were married a little more than a year later. Rick and Penny have two children, Eric, and Michael, both who have volunteered and worked at Woodhaven throughout the years in various departments. In fact, Eric has been employed full-time at Woodhaven for the past several years, previously working as an ESAC Inspector and now in the Utilities Department. "There are so many memories and memorable occurrences in my 40 plus years at Woodhaven, it's hard to single any particular one out," Rick explains. > Perhaps a moment Rick would like to forget came during a time when Woodhaven offered a job shadow program in the late 1990s and early 2000s. The program allowed employees to work in another Woodhaven department for half a day to get a different perspective on other job duties and department functions. Rick was very eager to help in the Maintenance Department, specifically learning to operate the large excavating equipment to dig in the dirt.

"I was job shadowing in Maintenance with John Brown on the Drott, the old, large maintenance excavator, helping to widen a ditch in Section 8. There wasn't room for two in the cab, so John, who was a magician on that piece equipment, let me operate it by myself," Rick recollects. "On my very second swipe with the bucket, I pulled up what looked like a thick black tree root."

Only it wasn't a tree root, but a main electric line from ComEd. Rick had proceeded to break the electric line, cutting power to Sections 4, 7, 8 and parts of 9.

"John asked me if I had seen sparks, which I didn't, so we just thought it was an abandoned line," Rick recalls. "It wasn't until we were leaving the area a bit later that the reports started coming of the power outages in those sections."

In his 40 years at Woodhaven, Rick worked with countless different employees within and between Woodhaven departments but has worked most closely with his office mate and the Public Safety Office Associate, a position held by Deb Inman for the past 11 years.

Deb, an avid Kentucky Wildcats fan who grew up in Barbourville, KY, came to Illinois after graduating high school at the invitation of her aunt in Mendota. As job opportunities seemed much better in the Mendota area than her hometown, Deb stayed and began working at Del Monte Foods in 1977.

Deb married her husband Mark on May 15, 1982, and they have two children, Holly, and Ashley, along with three grandchildren, Ian, Daniel, and Bethany.

Throughout her career, Deb has also worked in various positions at RR Donnelly, a marketing, printing, and packaging company in Mendota, as well as at Mendota Community Hospital in the medical records department.

Deb joined Woodhaven on July 1, 2013, as Public Safety Office Associate/Supervisor. Deb's main job duties (other than trying to keep Rick in line) include scheduling and supervision of the Main Gate Attendants, processing Public Safety citations, and preparing and coordinating cases for the Public Safety Board of Review hear-

"My job at Woodhaven has definitely been the favorite time of my working career," Deb proudly says. "The people here are so nice and everyone just works so well together."

While both Rick and Deb's career paths have taken different arcs throughout their lives, there are several similarities. In the time since Deb began working at Woodhaven, both Rick and Deb's children were married, and they both enjoyed the addition of three grandchildren each to their families.

"There are times we get both get back into the office after a weekend with the grandchildren and joke that we're glad to be back to work...for a rest!" Deb laughs.

Another thing they have in common is both will be retiring from Woodhaven within the next several weeks. Deb's retirement date is set for May 31, and Rick's last day of work is June 30.

Both Rick and Deb also have very similar retirements plans, which include travelling, and spending more time with their spouses, children, and grandchildren. Very soon, they won't have to show up to work for a rest from a busy family-filled weekend but will have the luxury of kicking back on the couch and taking a nap midday...pending spouse approval, of course!






New Package Policy

As you may have already read in previous issues of the *Woodhaven News*, the Board has adopted an official policy regarding Owner packages delivered to the Association Office. The below policy is in effect as of December; please be sure to read through all the parameters before ordering a package to be delivered to the Association. Packages received by the Association that do not follow the policy will be returned to the carrier without notice. This Policy can also be found in the Policy Manual as *04-200-1223 Package Handling Policy*.

- 1. Packages must be addressed to 509 Lamoille Rd., Sublette, IL 61367.
- 2. Packages must be addressed to an Owner of Record as shown on the deed, and the Section/Lot of the Owner must be listed in the address.
- 3. Packages weighing 60 pounds or less will be accepted. Any Packages received over 60 pounds will be rejected at time of receipt and returned to carrier, at no cost to the Association.
- 4. The Association will log the name of the person picking up packages. The Association is not responsible for the package(s) once they are logged out.
- 5. Owners are responsible for the removal of packages from the Association office area.
- 6. Packages are expected to be picked up within a week. Packages remaining 30 days after receipt will be returned to the carrier, at no cost to the Association.
- 7. Non-conformance to any part of this policy will result in rejection/return of the package(s) to the carrier without notice, and at no cost to the Association. Rejection/Return of packages to the carrier will be noted in the Association log.

How to Display The American Flag The U.S. flag stands for our nation and the stands for our na

The U.S. flag stands for our nation and the shared history, pride, principles, and commitment of its people. When we properly display this powerful symbol, we signal our respect for everything it represents.



The flag shouldn't be flown in inclement weather unless it's an all-weather flag.



Flags displayed at night should be properly illuminated.



In a time of national mourning, hang the flag at half-mast.

The flag can be flown every day, but it is often flown to show patriotism on these observances:

New Year's Day Inauguration Day Lincoln's Birthday Washington's Birthday Armed Forces Day Memorial Day

Flag Day Independence Day Labor Day Patriot Day Constitution Day Columbus Day Navy Day Veterans Day Thanksgiving Day Christmas Day

When displaying the flag ...



From your porch, place the union (blue section) at the peak of the staff.



Against a wall or on a window, place the union (blue section) at the top left corner.



On your vehicle, clamp the staff to the right front fender.



With another flag, place the U.S. flag to your left when crossed.



Keep your flag completely dry and folded properly — into a triangle, with the union (blue section) visible — before storing it in a well-ventilated area. If the flag is damaged or worn out, it should be disposed of with dignity.



The flag should not touch anything below it or rest on the ground.

U.S. FLAG ETIQUETTE INFORMATION

The laws relating to the flag of the United States of America are found in detail in the United States Code. Title 4, Chapter 1 pertains to the flag; Title 18, Chapter 33, Section 700 regards criminal penalties for flag desecration; Title 36, Chapter 3 pertains to patriotic customs and observances. These laws were supplemented by Executive Orders and Presidential Proclamations

The Flag Code, which formalizes and unifies the traditional ways in which we give respect to the flag, also contains specific instructions on how the flag is not to be used.

- The flag should never be dipped to any person or thing. It is flown upside down only as a distress signal.
- The flag should not be used as a drapery, or for covering a speaker's desk, draping a platform, or for any decoration in general. Bunting of blue, white and red stripes is available for these purposes. The blue stripe of the bunting should be on the top.
- The flag should never be used for any advertising purpose. It should not be embroidered, printed or otherwise impressed on such articles as cushions, handkerchiefs, napkins, boxes, or anything intended to be discarded after temporary use. Advertising signs should not be attached to the staff or halyard
- The flag should not be used as part of a costume or athletic uniform, except that a flag patch may be used on the uniform of military personnel, fireman, policeman and members of patriotic organizations.
- The flag should never have placed on it, or attached to it, any mark, insignia, letter, word, number, figure, or drawing of any kind.
- The flag should never be used as a receptacle for receiving, holding, carrying, or delivering anything.

When a flag is so worn it is no longer fit to serve as a symbol of our country, it should be destroyed by burning in a dignified manner

Our Woodhaven Lakes Veterans have provided a box at the Lakeview Building as a "drop off" location for your worn flags. They will be collected and disposed of in the correct, dignified manner.

Memorial Tree Program

With Spring just beginning we want to bring our NEW MEMORIAL TREE program into full bloom! Since the sun has set on the memorial benches, we want to shed some light on the new and improved program. While we all are aware we have lost a few trees over the years due to disease and mother nature, this program is designed to help reforest Woodhaven along with remembering all those lost loved ones who truly enjoyed Woodhaven.

Much like the Memorial Bench program, we will be offering options for location of trees. There are predetermined areas, depending on the type of tree you choose. The purchase of a memorial tree is \$200 and includes a staked plaque to commemorate your loved one. Participants in this program are welcomed and encouraged to assist with care and maintenance of your tree, such as watering, pulling weeds, or pruning broken branches. Please note - no additional "keepsakes" will be allowed to be placed around Memorial Trees.

Location Option 1: Northwest trail of Pine Lake.

• This option will be dedicated as the "Memorial Trail." This location will offer ornamental/flowering trees to create beautiful views while walking along the trail.

Location Option 2: Common Area Reforestation

• This option includes 3 potential locations; however these locations will be in common areas and only allow for hard wood varieties such as oaks and maples. The locations will be designated areas in Sec 29, Mikes Pond in section 6, and Section 8/Section 9 improved trail. These options are designed to help reforest Woodhaven in areas that have been devastated by the tornadoes.

Our first installation of Memorial Trees will be planted late fall/early winter of this year. In order to participate in this round, orders must be placed by Monday, September 2.

The Contractor Conundrum

Every year, the ESAC Department receives complaints regarding contractors who have not lived up to the Property Owner's expectations. Unfortunately, it is a common misconception that the Association endorses the contractors who conduct business at Woodhaven. Due to several recent incidents, we want to take this opportunity to educate our Property Owners on the Association's and ESAC's role, specifically with contractors.

As a courtesy to our Property Owners, the ESAC Department maintains a list of individuals and companies who have applied to conduct business at Woodhaven Lakes. An individual or business interested in registering as a contractor must provide the Association, specifically the ESAC Department, with proof of \$1,000,000.00 liability insurance and pay a \$100.00 yearly fee for the privilege of gaining access via a contractor's pass. This automatically adds them to our contractor list, which is available in hard copy in the ESAC and Association Office and on the website/app. Contractors may also advertise in the Woodhaven News for a fee.

The Association does not endorse or recommend any individual or business that has obtained a contractor pass to conduct business at Woodhaven. These are not "approved" contractors by the Association, a term which is commonly used by Property Owners when an issue arises. They are not "approved" contractors, merely "registered" with the Association.

On every Contractor list, as well as the website, the following disclaimer is noted: "The contractors that are listed with Woodhaven Association have current insurance on file and have a permit to perform work on Woodhaven property. Contractors are required to abide by the Rules and Regulations set forth by the Association. THE ASSOCIATION CANNOT GUARANTEE NOR BE HELD RESPONSIBLE FOR THE WORK DONE OR AGREEMENTS MADE BETWEEN THE Property Owner AND THE CONTRACTOR. It is recommended that Property Owners request a detailed written contract with the contractor before any work is done or payment is made. The Association in no way recommends one contractor over another; we are merely stating which contractors have met their requirements with Woodhaven Asso-

The Woodhaven News also runs a disclaimer in every edition on the inside cover which states: "The Woodhaven News disclaims any liability for any advertisements published herein and in no way endorses or guarantees these ads."

When looking for a contractor, it is the responsibility of each individual to carefully consider the contractor they are retaining and do their due diligence to be sure the individual has the skills and appropriate licenses to complete the job they are being hired to perform. References and a signed contract are strongly recommended. Property Owners are also encouraged to contact the ESAC Office to check if any complaints (Speak-Up Sheets) have been filed against the contractor.

The ESAC Office does recommend filling out a Speak-Up Sheet when a situation arises with a contractor. We are only able to follow up when a written complaint is received. Verbal complaints and venting online will not result in any type of solution to your issue. While the ESAC Department will contact the contractor when a Speak-UP Sheet complaint is received, it is ultimately a contract between the Property Owner and the contractor, not the Association or its agents.

Should the ESAC Department receive three written complaints against a contractor within a twelve-month period, the contractor is required to appear before the ESAC Board of Review to discuss these complaints. If the accusations are significantly egregious and/or are substantiated, it can result in revocation of their privileges.

Property Owners may also hire a contractor who has not gone through the ESAC Department to obtain a contractor pass. The Property Owner must provide their contractor with one of their passes for access to Woodhaven; the Property Owner must obtain the permit and assume all responsibility for the actions of their contractor while working at Woodhaven. For instance, if they run a stop sign, or drop a tree on a neighboring property, you as the Property Owner, will receive the citation.

It is important to note that ESAC Code Enforcement Inspectors are not licensed Building Inspectors. ESAC Inspectors check to see if the permit which was obtained has met the criteria of Woodhaven Rules and Regulations in regard to setback, and other outlined considerations, and if the project appears to be completed.

Fire Extinguishers: You should have at least two 5LB ABC Fire Extinguishers, you should inspect them once a year making sure that they are fully charged and ready to go.

Inspecting Fire Extinguisher: Inspecting - check the gauge to make sure the Gauge needle is in the Green as well checking the hose, making sure there are no kinks or damage to the hose' By doing so you are making sure your unit is ready to go.

If the gauge needle is in the red or 10yrs old, then it should be replaced.

How to use an Extinguisher: Use the Acronym P.A.S.S Pull- Aim- Squeeze and Sweep at the Base of the Fire.



Camp Fire Safety: Remember to never leave your campfire unattended, and always extinguish your campfires when turning in for the night. Never use Accelerants -Flammable liquids to start your fire by doing so this may or will cause a flash explosion and bodily harm or death.

Always have a water source, a garden hose or water Fire extinguisher nearby.

AQUATICS FACILITIES - RULES AND REGULATIONS —

POOL 1 & POOL 2 - GENERAL RULES

- Children under the age of ten(10) must be supervised by someone fourteen(14) yrs. old & up OR an adult if determined by staff.
- Bathers with any contagious disease or infectious condition are not allowed in the water.
- Bathers with open cuts or abrasions are not allowed in the water.
- Proper swimming attire is required in the pool. Swimsuits must have a proper lining; no cut-offs, no shorts without lining, no bras /training bras.
- Children who are not toilet trained must wear a swim diaper.
- Only clean footwear, baby strollers, and wheelchairs are allowed on the pool deck and in the bathhouse.
- Only clean swim shoes are allowed in the water.
- All bathers are encouraged to shower prior to entering the water. Bathers may be required to shower as determined by staff.
- Stay clear of lifeguards and do not converse with them while on duty.
- No alcohol allowed, no intoxicated individuals allowed.
- Food and drink are limited to designated areas only. No glass containers allowed.
- No foul language/horseplay. No loud music or yelling.
- Smoking is not allowed.
- · Fence must remain clear.
- No running on the deck.
- Do not walk in, stand on, or jump from the pool gutter.
- Personal floatation device(PFD) users must be supervised and in the shallow water only.
- No floatable toys, rafts, balls, etc. are allowed in the main pool.
- Stay clear of stairs and ladders except to enter/exit.
- The pool must close and patrons must exit entire facility when thunder is heard or lightning is seen, including a 15 minute period after the last lightning or thunder detected.
- ALL swimmers must exit the pool following a fecal or vomit accident until water is tested, cleaned, and treated(30 min.)
- Actions that are unsafe or a nuisance to others will be determined and restricted by staff.
- No pets are allowed in any areas.

POOL 2 - WATER SLIDE RULES

- One person on the slide at a time.
- Enter/exit slide feet first only.
- Do no slow or stop in slide.
- Swim away from and exit the slide area immediately at the nearest ladder.
- Actions that are unsafe or a nuisance to others will be determined and retricted by staff.



POOL 1 & POOL 2 - CHILDREN'S POOL RULES

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

4/27/2024 - Motion was made and seconded "to keep a nuisance permit from the IDNR on the table for further discussion."



Environmental and Ecological impacts of deer over-population

Ecosystems are a very complex and delicate balance of a biological community of interacting organisms with their physical environment. Ecosystems take hundreds of years to develop and are constantly changing. There is a myriad of ways an eco-system can change. One study that was conducted by John Litaitis (emeritus professor of wildlife ecology) focused on an area where oaks and maples are a dominant component of mature hardwoods in the forest. Foresters observed their inability to regenerate young oaks and maples after a timber harvest. Timber harvests are planned with the expectation that sprouts and seeds retained from trees will provide sufficient regeneration. With such a large population of deer in the area they suppressed the growth of sprout and seedlings from oaks and maples, preventing

them from repopulating the forest canopy. With the substantial amount of browsing the conclusion is that both maples and oaks would eventually disappear from the forests, and the forest would become dominated by tree species that the deer didn't eat. This shift in tree composition has significant ramifications. This shift degrades the habitat for a wide variety of animals that consume oak acorns and maple seeds or use these hardwoods in other parts of their life cycles. Degrading an ecosystem can happen quickly and can possibly go unnoticed for many years. The damage that is done may take many decades to return to a healthy, balanced ecosystem.



Deer exclusion structures

The six deer exclusion structures have been in for just over a year now. They were all placed in the beginning of March in 2023. Some of the structures have started to show noticeable differences from inside to outside of the fence. In the picture below there are 2 main observations, the color of the new growth inside the fence and how much fuller the shrub is on the inside vs. the outside of the fence line. We will continue to monitor the progress of the structures and take pictures weekly throughout the growing season.



In regard to the Illinois Department of Natural Resources section 635.40 Feeding or baiting wildlife, It shall be illegal to make available food, salt, mineral blocks or other products for ingestion by wild deer or other wildlife in areas where wild deer are present.

Bird/squirrel feeders providing seed, grain, fruit, worms or suet for birds or squirrels should be elevated. We are recommending a minimum of 8 feet high in elevation so deer cannot reach the feeders.

- 12. No unattended fishing devices allowed at any time on any of the lakes. Unattended devices can cause mortality to fish and turtles that should be released if undersize as well as interfere with boaters using the lakes.
- 13. No trotline or jug fishing on any of the lakes. Given our fisheries are recreational, I believe these devices are damaging to our fisheries and interfere with boaters using the lakes.







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WOODHAVEN FIRE BANS

They say spring comes in like a lion and goes out like a lamb...but we know better here at Woodhaven. This year in particular, it seems spring came in with a vengeance and hasn't let up. If it was a bright sunny day, there were 30+ mph wind gusts, and if we didn't have wind, we had rain.

Sometimes it feels like we have daily fire bans; just when you think it's finally a day there couldn't possibly be a fire ban, there are rolls of thunder in the distance, making your plans for a cozy fire obsolete.

It may seem odd to receive the dreaded "fire ban in place" notification from the Woodhaven Lakes app even during a rainstorm, or maybe you've wondered why there *hasn't* been a fire ban on a breezy day. Public Safety utilizes a short, but not limited, list of criteria for issuing a fire ban. The following guidelines are used when determining when to issue a fire ban:

- 1. Any wind advisory, warning, or red flag warning issued by the National Weather Service.
- 2. Sustained winds of 20 mph or greater.
- 3. Wind gusts 30 mph or greater.
- 4. Drought conditions.
- 5. A combination of the above, or other extenuating circumstances.

Once Public Safety determines a fire ban needs to be put in place, notifications are sent internally to staff, posted at facilities, sent through the app, and posted to our Facebook page.

A fire ban restricts the following:

- 1. Building a campfire in any manner.
- 2. Smoking a pipe, cigar, or cigarette outdoors (it is legal to smoke in a vehicle equipped with an ashtray).
- 3. Throwing matches, ashes, or burning materials from a vehicle.
- 4. Burning combustible materials in any or all restricted areas.

As always, please enjoy your campfires responsibly and always have a water source nearby.

Summer is when we start to see lots of bugs. Different bugs come out at different times based on the weather and temperatures. Scientists and researchers use "Growing Degree Days" (GDD) to determine the timing of when certain bugs or insects might show up. This is especially helpful for farmers, landscapers, and nurseries that deal with trying to control pest species that can harm crops, food sources, and nursery plants.

Growing degree days are an accumulation of heating days. It starts with a base temperature. For many species, this temperature is 50°F (during spring when the average temperature starts to climb above this). Above this temperature, insect development starts. The number of degrees above the 50-degree base is used to calculate the number of degree days for that day. An example would be



the temperature starting at 39 and climbing to 65; the average temperature is determined by adding 39 + 65 and then dividing by 2, which equals 52. 52 minus the base temperature of 50 = 2. This is the number of accumulated degree days. There are websites that can help you figure this number out. A bug like the Japanese Beetle needs about 1,030 GDD to start developing and continue until 2,150 GDD. If we followed the GDD during summer, this would show that July is the most common time for this bug to appear and start causing problems in our gardens and more.

GDD is not the only way to use temperatures to determine nature happenings. The upcoming cicada emergence is also based on temreaches 64-degrees F. Find out more about cicadas below!

Nature Nuggets: Let's take a closer look at local nature!

Let's take a closer look at the Periodical Cicada! Periodical cicada's (Magicicada spp) are found throughout most of Illinois and around the world. There are over 190 known kinds of cicadas in North America and at least 3,000 species globally. Many species have "brood" numbers, which are a certain group of cicadas



that appear at a specific time. Unlike the yearly annual cicada, different periodical cicadas appear every 13 or 17 years, spending most of that time underground growing slowly.

Adult periodical cicadas are black above and orange underneath. They have bright red eyes and clear wings with black veins. They average 1.5 inches in length and have a 3-inch wingspan.


This year, the 17-year periodical cicada (Brood XIII) will emerge in parts of Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, and Wisconsin, including the Woodhaven area. A second group, the 13-year periodical cicada (Brood XIX) will emerge in central and southern Illinois and Missouri to Louisiana, east to Virginia. The excitement this year is that these two broods will be emerging around the same time. They will just barely overlap in central Illinois around the Springfield area. This is the first time these two large broods have emerged together since 1803, over 200 years!

Periodical cicadas will emerge when the upper 8 inches of soil peratures. Periodical cicadas occur when the soil at 8-inches deep reach 64-degrees Fahrenheit. Areas in full sun and southern exposure will be first to see the bugs, followed by cooler areas. This should start in mid-May and be over around the end of June or early July.

> Cicadas are not harmful to humans and pets. Cicadas don't bite and they don't sting. Cicadas will go away on their own. Adult cicadas do not eat leaves, flowers, fruits, or garden produce. They will

consume small amounts of sap from trees and shrubs. Young trees may need protection from the large numbers of cicadas expected to appear this year. These trees may or smaller openings. Larger more established trees will be fine.

Fun fact: Cicada calls can be very loud! The sounds are males singof their bodies.

In order to provide Owners a way to dispose of restricted items in the refuse industry, we have provided roll off dumpsters at the Maintenance Shop; dumpsters are accessible 24/7 for Property Owners. You will need your Property Owner pass to access the site. Please make note of limits and pricing. Items that have a fee will need to be paid for at the Association Office prior to be taken to the dumpsters.

Materials we will accept

Appliances(white goods): Refrigerators, freezers, ranges, water, heaters, air conditioners, and humidifiers; 1 per lot Electronics: laptops/monitors/keyboards; 3 per lot, \$5 per item

TVs: 1 per lot, \$25

Microwaves: 1 per lot, \$5

Propane Tanks: 20 pound cylinders only; 1 per lot

Concrete: We will accept a wheelbarrow-sized load or smaller Furniture: We will accept all furniture unless it is determined

to be a health hazard; 3 per lot

Metals: Large; 1 per lot | Small; 5 per lot

Large - lawn mowers, grills, swing sets, patio sets Small - lawn chairs, lawn ornaments, bird feeders

Construction/Demolition Debris: we will only accept small amounts, for example, a wheelbarrow-sized load; limit 1 load per lot, or bring extra loads at a cost of \$5.00 per wheelbarrow load. The material must be clean, no nails, spikes, staples, etc. Property Owners are required to obtain their own container from a waste hauler for construction or demolition projects generating larger amounts of debris.

Materials we will NOT accept

Hazardous chemicals: paint thinner, turpentine, herbicides, pesticides, fertilizers, etc- contact your local recycler

Liquids of any kind: anti freeze, fuels, etc – contact your local O'Reilly's, AutoZone, or car service center

Oils: motor oil, vehicle lubricants, cooking oils, etc- contact your local O'Reilly's, AutoZone, Tire/Lube Center

Unsolidified paint: Oil based: contact your local recycler, Latex: cat litter or paint hardener to solidify (available at Woody's True Value)

Tires: Contact your local tire dealer

Batteries: Contact your Home Depot, Staples, etc.

Fluorescent bulbs: contact your local Home Depot, Lowes, or Battery Plus Bulbs center

Any of the above items that are brought to the drop-off will be marked by staff so their origin can be identified if found in an outlot or in or near a garbage container.

UNACCEPTABLE MATERIALS AT THE LANDFILL

DO NOT DISPOSE OF THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN THE GARBAGE CONTAINERS:
